### **Youth Club UK and Associated Speakers**

#### **Organisation Overview**

- Name: Youth Club UK
- Mission: Non-profit, non-sectarian, non-political organization focused on youth empowerment through Islamic values, motivational talks, and community outreach.
- Website: youthclubuk.co.uk
- Style: Landing-page format with emphasis on events, speaker bios, and membership sign-ups.
- Charity Status: The site does not list a UK Charity Commission registration number, positioning itself as a non-profit but not formally registered as a UK charity.

## **UK Speeches and Events**

### Confirmed Event:

- *Day of Qiamah* with Tuaha Ibn Jalil, Al Falah Centre, West Drayton (London Borough of Hillingdon), 17 December 2025.
- Planned Tour Destinations (Dec 2025): London, Manchester, Birmingham, Leicester, Cardiff, Oxford (school event cancelled).
- Format: Mosque/community centre lectures, university talks, and youth workshops.
- Past Programs: "Winds of Change" (WOC) initiative since 2012, featuring debates and workshops in Pakistan and internationally, later extended to UK venues.

### **Tuaha Ibn Jalil (Kuaha Jacil)**

- Identity: Pakistani influencer and preacher with millions of followers online.
- Controversy:
  - Called for Muslims to travel to Palestine for "jihad."
  - Made antisemitic remarks.
- UK Tour: Scheduled for December 2025, including schools and mosques.
- Government Action: UK Home Secretary revoked his visa; Oxford school event cancelled.
- Outcome: Tour blocked, raising concerns about extremist rhetoric reaching UK youth.



## Website Characteristics

- Landing Page: Focused on mission, events, and membership.
- Content Modules: Speaker bios, event promotion, blog posts, contact form.
- No Charity Number: Reinforces non-profit positioning but not listed as a UK charity.

## Social Media Presence

- Organisation Accounts: Active on YouTube, Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, LinkedIn.
- Scale Indicators:
  - Tuaha Ibn Jalil himself has ~2 million Instagram followers.
  - Youth Club UK's own follower counts are not listed on the website; platform-native checks required for exact numbers.
- Usage: Event promotion, motivational clips, livestreams, and Dawah-focused outreach.



## **Analysis**

- Strengths: Strong motivational presence, large social media reach, active UK event coordination.
- Concerns:
  - Lack of UK charity registration transparency.
  - Association with controversial figures (Tuaha Ibn Jalil).
  - Youth-targeted outreach raises safeguarding questions.
- Opportunities: Clearer governance, transparent charity registration, and focus on positive youth development.

### **In summary**

Youth Club UK is a non-profit youth outreach organization with strong speaker-led programs and social media presence. It is not listed as a UK charity, and its December 2025 UK tour featuring Tuaha Ibn Jalil was cancelled after controversy. Leadership includes Raja Zia ul Haq (CEO), Nadeem Ashraf (UK & Europe CEO), and other speakers, with Martin Williams providing legal advisory support. The agenda is clear and focussed on ensuring the switch to ISLAM yet claim to be non secular. This is a major concern targeting the British youths from non muslim backgrounds and the statement is clear of their intent as they were key in promoting the radical speaker , targeting youth and social media.

**Outcome will be Youth radicalisation**
