Concerns Raised Over Undeclared Directorship Held by Sir Keir Starmer

A formal complaint has been submitted to the Parliamentary Commissioner for Standards regarding a potential breach of the House of Commons Code of Conduct by the Rt Hon Sir Keir Starmer MP.

Public filings at Companies House show that Sir Keir Starmer served as a director of *The Death Penalty Project Limited* from **11 November 2005 until 5 April 2020**. This period includes his time as Director of Public Prosecutions and the first five years of his service as a Member of Parliament.

Under parliamentary rules, MPs must declare all directorships — paid or unpaid — as well as any positions that might reasonably be perceived to influence their actions as elected representatives. However, no such declaration appears in the Register of Members' Financial Interests for the relevant period.

The complaint requests that the Commissioner investigate whether this omission constitutes a breach of the Code of Conduct and whether Parliament was provided with a complete and accurate record of the MP's external roles.

No conclusion has yet been reached, and the matter now rests with the Commissioner's office for assessment.
